June is London Bike Month!






Looking for ways to celebrate cycling during Bike Month?

- Explore London's multi-use pathways and bike lanes or take part in one of the many Bike Month events, including Forest City Slow Roll, a casually paced 10 km bike parade on Saturday, June 1st at 4 pm. This free event starts and ends at Dundas Place and is suitable for riders of all levels.

Personal electric kick-scooters

- They can be parked at bike racks like a bicycle.
- The speed limit is 24 km/hr. You must obey all posted speed limits (e.g., the Thames Valley Parkway has different speed limits than a roadway).
- You must be 16 years old or older to ride one.
- You must wear a helmet if you are 16 or 17 years old.
- · You cannot carry passengers or cargo.

Green Bin tips for warmer temperatures:

- Place your Green Bin to the curb each week, even if partially full. This will help with reducing odours and reduce attracting pests.
- Consider placing food scraps into your Green Bin just before collection.
- Store your Green Bin out of direct sunlight and keep the latch locked at all times.
- Rinse your kitchen container and Green Bin regularly to eliminate odours and keep clean. Both can be cleaned with dish soap.

When in doubt, leave it out. You can always use the Recycle Coach app to answer your questions about what can go into your Green Bin.

London's Climate Emergency Action Plan

April 2024 marked the second year since the **Climate Emergency** Action Plan (CEAP) was approved by City Council. It is the City's first comprehensive climate action plan addressing both mitigation and adaptation. A lot of work has been done to reduce emissions and improve London's resilience to climate change impacts.
